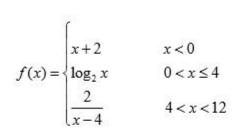


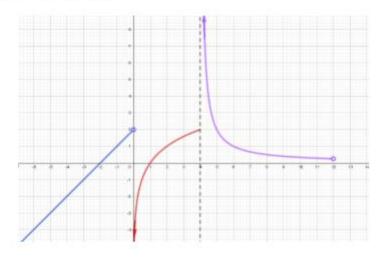

Exercise 1: (2 ptos) Sketch the graph of the piecewise function:



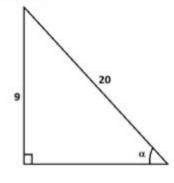


Exercise 2: (2.25 ptos) Work out using the properties of logarithms:

a)
$$\frac{\log_5 27 + \log_5 3}{\log_5 2187 - \log_5 81} = \frac{4}{3}$$

b)
$$\log_7 \frac{\sqrt{7} \cdot \sqrt[9]{49}}{\sqrt[5]{2401}} = \frac{-7}{90}$$

Exercise 3: (1.5 ptos) Find the six trigonometric functions of the angle α with four decimal figures:



$$\sin \alpha = 0.45 \rightarrow \csc \alpha = 2.2222$$

 $\cos \alpha = 0.45 \rightarrow \sec \alpha = 1.1198$
 $\tan \alpha = 0.5039 \rightarrow \csc \alpha = 1.9844$

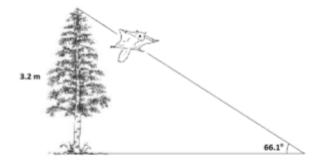
Exercise 4: (1.25 ptos) Find the area of a regular octagon with sides of length 14 cm $A_0 = 946.37$ cm²



Exercise 5: (1.25 ptos) If $\tan \alpha = 1.75$ find the values of $\sin \alpha$, $\cos \alpha$ and the angle α expressed using degrees, minutes and seconds. Round to four decimal figures.

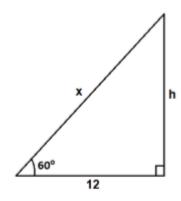
$$\cos \alpha = 0.2462$$
 $\sin \alpha = 0.8682 \rightarrow \alpha = 60^{\circ}15'18"$

Exercise 6: (0.75 ptos) My squirrel is learning to fly and since she knows a lot of Math, she wants to know the distance from the top of the tree to the ground, making a straight line (not vertical!!!). She measured the angle with the goniometry in her eyes and she got a value of 66.1° . Now she's ready to jump. Knowing that the height of the tree is of 3.2 m, do you think that she will she make it?



x = 3.5 m, so I am sure that she will make it because I do trust my squirrel

Exercise 7: (1 pto) Find the lengths of the missing sides without using a calculator:



$$x = 24$$
$$h = 12\sqrt{3}$$
